A Letter from the President

Minutes of the August 2016 Meeting

Date and Location: Saturday, August 6, 2016 at the Horton Flying Field

Call to Meeting: President Jerry Craig called the meeting to order at 11:03 AM on a Saturday morning with 18 members in attendance, including Vice-President Durbin Seidel, Treasurer Jim Ferry, and Secretary David Dust.

Minutes: The minutes of the July meeting were approved unanimously.

Treasurer's Report: Treasurer Jim Ferry reported the club's current checkbook balance is \$5,169.58 and the savings balance is \$7,524.18. The treasurer's report was approved unanimously.

Safety Officer's Report: In Safety Officer Joe Wilson's absence, President Craig relayed the Safety Officer's message to "fly safe and have fun"!

Old Business: David Sampson and Vice President Seidel reported that the AMA has not written any rules that address non-engine related noise issues. The motion to **not** revise the Club's rules to include an "excessive noise" type rule was approved unanimously.

2. President Craig described investigations into non-woven geotextile fabrics appropriate for resurfacing the north runway apron that has deteriorated. The Geotex fabric available at a Centennial distributor comes in 300 ft. by 15 ft. rolls that cost \$600 per roll. Vice-President Durbin's motion to spend up to \$650 dollars for the Geotex fabric and appropriate staples was approved unanimously. (Update: Two panels of the north runway apron and one panel of the south runway apron were covered with new fabric on Tuesday August 23rd by Carl Anderson, Jerry Craig, Fred Damm, Mathew Davis, Dave Dust, Jerry Gallaher, Garret Hultgren, Mike Lohr, Jack Patton, Jeff Stolzenburg, and Don Weber.)

New Business: Concern was expressed regarding the weathered appearance of the fire extinguisher and Vice-President Durbin volunteered to check if the extinguisher should be more protected from UV exposure.

2. President Craig announced that Club officer nominations will be taken at the September 3rd Club Meeting for the elections at the October Club Meeting, per the Club's By-Laws.

Meeting Adjourned at approximately 11:30 AM and the Club's warbirds/cookout event recommenced.

Next Meeting: The next meeting will be on Saturday, September 3rd, 2016 at 11:00 AM at the Horton Field.
